




## Enrolled Kessler Scholars in 2022-23 across six inaugural partner campuses




The Kessler Scholars Program serves a diverse population of first-generation students across categories of race and ethnicity, gender, and academic disciplines.











Program Staff identify as first-generation students

Funded by the Judy and Fred Wilpon Family Foundation and Bloomberg Philanthropies, the Kessler Scholars Program is a comprehensive, cohort-based program designed to support first-generation, limited-income college students through a combination of financial aid and robust, evidence-informed support programming, with the goals of advancing outcomes and closing equity gaps for participants.

Ithaka S+R provides research and strategic guidance to help the academic and cultural communities serve the public good and navigate economic, demographic, and technological change. Ithaka S+R is part of ITHAKA, a not-for-profit with a mission to improve access to knowledge and education for people around the world. The 2022-23 evaluation focused on assessing the effectiveness of the Collaborative's support to participating institutions, understanding the program model at each institution, and capturing the backgrounds, experiences and outcomes of students who are participating in the program. The evidence presented in this brief draws on data collected by the evaluation team from surveys of program staff, participant observation at Collaborative meetings and events, and reviews of program documentation.
